Holly Joshi is the Executive Director at MISSSEY, a youth serving non-profit dedicated to providing direct services and advocacy for survivors of commercial sexual exploitation. Holly has 15 years of committed public service experience and a decade of leadership and advocacy work in the movement to end the commercial sexual exploitation of children. She led the Oakland Police Department's Child Exploitation Unit, served as the chief of staff at the OPD, and was the deputy director at the youth-serving non-profit Youth Uprising. Holly has worked collaboratively across sectors to improve system responses to survivors of trafficking since 2008, served on Attorney General Kamala Harris' Task Force on Human Trafficking, and trained law enforcement and service providers across the country on human trafficking response as a member of the training team at National Criminal Justice Training Center. As the chief of staff at the Oakland Police Department, she served on Kamala Harris' Task Force on 21st Century Policing and was an integral part of the executive team that implemented one of the first department-wide body worn camera programs in the nation.
